ALTA architectes urbanistes Le Trionnaire - Le Chapelain

We keep the value of the human being as the guideline of our reflection.

Each project is an opportunity to work specifically on the context. Our architecture wants to be situated, in direct link with the sites and the situations which are proposed to us.

We look for the specificities of the place to draw from its urban, natural, historical or sociological environment. These data feed and assemble to form an architecture.

As the contexts in which we evolve are rarely homogeneous, our writing tends to be hybrid. Indeed, by a combinatorial approach of signs (borrowed from close and distant environments), we seek a re-reading of the universes in which we intervene (urban, rural, peripheral).

This approach can be defined as a research of writing without pastiche but anchored in a region, a place.

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The architectures of ALTA between freedom, diversity and mastery

If the architects want to avoid parading around in a flowery universe, they must take charge of the resistance of reality. To do this, Maxime Le Trionnaire and Gwenaël Le Chapelain combine contradictory properties within ALTA, between freedom, diversity and mastery in the wake of their reassuring elders Jean-Luc Le Trionnaire and Alain Tassot.

There is in them this inexhaustible quest for the mastery of an impalpable thing: how to imagine the social relationships that can be woven within a space that one inhabits? Even if everything is planned, life and its avatars will inevitably interfere with it, on a daily basis. Along the way, they seek to « defatalize « the question of housing - today in crisis, as we all know, but has housing ever been seen to emerge on its own without its usual double, the crisis, since the large housing estates, the Loucheur pavilions, the Winter of '54 and the Abbé Pierre?

We have to give them credit for tackling this housing «issue» from its steepest and therefore riskiest side: the tower. In Nantes first, on the Pré-Gauchet, with the Tour Amazonie, where the differentiated qualities of the housing units have made it possible to design the diversity of the façade.

The second floors are still urban. Then the signal takes shape, very clearly, thanks to the extensions. The relative modesty of the size of the apartments is largely compensated for by the generosity of the outdoor spaces, particularly the two-bedroom apartments with their vast loggias. Some of them even express an atypical ratio of surfaces between the interior and the exterior, with the latter sometimes providing more than twice the surface area of the living room. In the background, the architects were of course thinking of the veranda, this qualitative extension of the pavilion that has become the desired horizon for many French people. Not to mention the garden... with the city at its feet. It is remarkable that some of the apartments in the coronation have two vast extensions: a terrace and a winter garden, in other words, a front garden and a back garden.

Spatial change versus social change: this is a belligerent and therefore inseparable couple when it comes to innovation in architecture. The speed of space, and of the projects that come from the imaginations of architects, frequently collides with the slowness of social change and formatted imaginations. By proposing a Semaphore called to rise soon to 55 meters in the sensitive horizon of the gates of the historic city of Saint-Malo, ALTA has wisely calculated the risk that

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consisted in building a new contemporary building near a city entirely rebuilt after the bombings of the Second World War - to realize this, one only has to turn one's gaze to an aerial photo of the heart of the corsair city before the air raids and after the work of Louis Arretche, the chief architect of the Reconstruction. It was like the Marais in Paris, it is by rebuilding «modern» that Saint-Malo had, again, the future ahead. Saint-Malo is modern turned classic, as Roland Barthes would have said. The city is insolent, it allows itself tricks. And this Semaphore to come is a great breath of fresh air that crosses a fifty-year-old closed city where we sometimes had a tendency to suffocate: compressing history into a project. The future belongs to those who stand up.

But how exactly can we define ALTA's style? Style is a word of dissensus, a word on which we are not, we will never all agree. Because it's a word where values fight, and which brings out convictions about what we value. There is an obvious freedom, but also something clear-cut and unambiguous in ALTA's projects, which most of the time do not compromise on the issues at the basis of the transformation. Never wavering and playing with the large and the small, whether it is a question of grouped houses or high-rise buildings, the question is most of the time treated in an unabashed mode... in Eurorennes as in Charleville-Mézières.

The facets of the great striated rock of Urban Quartz, designed with the Parisian couple Hamonic & Masson, have thus welcomed the new LGV without hesitating to show themselves as a reminiscence of crystal, while the modest 16 houses grouped in a loop of the Meuse at Arthur Rimbaud's in the Manchester district do not lie about their situation: an initiatory project in the ANRU zone that favors wood, confirms the presence of vegetation and marks with its presence a plot carved into a point. Stretching lines, pointing directions,

and configuring spaces that take shape: in the same way, on the banks of the Loire in the Nantes region, the indented facades and the split masses of the Roselières, as if cut into the thickness, stand guard over the pioneering front of the new district that has redrawn the west of Couëron, where the emerged lands come up against the wet estuary. On a former edge, the social housing units and those for sale have been generously pierced to play without complex on the contrast between the smoothness of the shiny metal cladding and the roughness of the dark concrete. They tell the story of an impalpable, unwritten network of named things that now weave a new landscape.

The smooth and the rough, this is perhaps what could characterize ALTA's architectures, reminiscent of the «striated spaces» dear to Gilles Deleuze and crossed by speeds and slowness. The city has always been a reflection of the world, the architectures have always reflected a moment of civilization. And the world exists all the more because it is a human world, streaked with conflicts and crossed by aspirations. We need to add raw places to smooth spaces, if we want to see contemporary individuals remain connected to the world.
